Asphalt 9: Legends There aren’t too many free-to-play racing titles for the Switch, making Asphalt 9: Legends a shoo-in for inclusion on this list of the best free Nintendo Switch games. If all you want to do is drive a cool car, though, you don’t need to spend anything. 2. Brawlhalla Without a doubt, Super Smash Bros. Ultimate is one of the best games for the Nintendo Switch. However, that’s a full-price title, so it will set you back at least \$50. Enter Brawlhalla, which is like Smash but doesn’t cost anything, making it one of the best free Nintendo Switch games.As with Super Smash Bros., Brawlhalla lets you pick from dozens of different fighters so you can brawl it out in various environments. It’s a lot simpler than Smash, though, with a bit more restraint on speed and fighting combos. If you like the concept of Smash but find it to be a bit overwhelming, you might like Brawlhalla (and it’s free, so you don’t lose anything by giving it a go).There are microtransactions in Brawlhalla, but there is no benefit to spending any money other than aesthetics. As long as you don’t care about your characters’ skins or anything like that, you can enjoy the game indefinitely without spending a cent. 3. Color Zen It’s very appropriate that the word “Zen” is in the title of this game, as that’s the feeling you get playing it. Between the trip-hop-inspired chillout soundtrack to the floating colors smoothly gliding into each other, Color Zen is probably one of the most relaxing games ever.As with most puzzle games, Color Zen starts incredibly simple and gets more difficult the longer you play. The free version of the game comes with dozens of such levels, and the developers hope you’ll like them enough to want more. That’s where the surprisingly cheap (we’re talking one dollar) DLC packs come in, which offer themed levels to keep you in that Zen moment. It was inevitable that Fortnite would end up on this list of the best free Nintendo Switch games, as the thing is nothing short of a phenomenon. Although it certainly didn’t invent the battle royale genre, it pretty much defines it at this point, considering how its popularity has grown beyond anyone’s expectations.We’re not going to go deep into the game as most gamers have played it on any number of the platforms on which you can get it (including Android). Basically, the gameplay is the same as on any other console, it’s just that now it’s on the Switch.As usual, the game is totally free and will stay that way forever. If you’d like to upgrade your character’s looks in some way, that will cost you some cash, but the game itself can be downloaded right now and played for hundreds of hours without spending a dime. 5. Pokémon Quest The mainline Pokémon games for the Switch — Pokémon Sword and Shield and the earlier Pokémon: Let’s Go, Pikachu and Let’s Go, Eevee — are some of the best-selling titles on the console. In many respects, Pokémon Quest is not as good as those other games, but Quest has the distinction of being one of the best free Nintendo Switch games, something the other games can’t claim.As one would expect, Pokémon Quest involves you searching for and befriendng Pokémon. However, the distinctive cube-art design of the game makes it look different from other Pokémon titles, and its smaller scale (not to mention microtransactions) makes it feel different, too.Truth be told, you don’t need to spend any money at all to play Pokémon Quest. One of those experiments is Super Kirby Clash, a game exclusive to the Switch that is also one of the best free Nintendo Switch games you can play today.Super Kirby Clash is built for multiplayer, either online or local. You go on quests with up to four different Kirbys — each with their own speciality — and fight it out with bosses in the colorful world.Nintendo hopes you’ll pony up some dough to buy weapon upgrades, skins, and other trinkets. Tetris 99 How do you take Tetris — one of the most popular and famous games of all time — and modernize it for something as advanced as the Nintendo Switch? Well, someone thought pitting 99 Tetris players against each other would do the trick. It worked because Tetris 99 is easily one of the best free Nintendo Switch games and might even be the very best of the free Switch games.If you know how to play Tetris (and honestly, who doesn’t at this point?), you know how to play Tetris 99. The only difference is that you’ll be going up against nearly 100 other players when you play, and only one person is going to walk away as the champion of the round.There is a caveat here: to play Tetris 99 the way it’s intended, you’ll need to be a Nintendo Switch Online subscriber. This is what enables you to log on to online games. There is a way to play Tetris 99 offline against 98 CPU players, but that will cost you a one-time fee of \$10. Assuming you’re a Switch Online subscriber, though, the free version is likely all you need. 9. Warframe One of the most popular free-to-play games on the Switch is Warframe. It’s an action RPG with over-the-shoulder third-person controls. Set in the distant future, the game centers on an ancient alien race awoken from suspended animation only to find themselves at war with the various factions.Most of Warframe’s levels are procedurally generated, but there are some story-specific levels that advance the game’s plot. In general, you run-and-gun your character around, taking out baddies, leveling up, equipping new gear, etc.Warframe is totally free to play and makes its money the salsic way as many other games on this list: microtransaction upgrades. However, the good news is that you can earn every upgrade in the game through grinding if you don’t want to spend any cash. This levels the playing field a bit, as every player can access every upgrade — although players with money to burn will advance much quicker.If you’re looking for a free hero-style shooter, you can try Apex Legends, too. You just have to choose your legend and build your crew as you take on battle royale and arena situations. There are in-game transactions as usual, but it doesn’t take away from the fun you can have. 10. Zaccaria Pinball This might be the most unexpected entry on this list of the best free Nintendo Switch games. However, there aren’t too many pinball machine sims available on the Switch, and it’s a fun — if oft-overlooked — genre of game.As one would expect, Zaccaria Pinball lets you play virtual pinball machines. However, what’s really cool is that many of the tables are replicas of actual machines created by Zaccaria, the third-largest pinball machine manufacturer in the world.Two tables are offered for free play when you download the game (Time Machine and Time Machine Retro). You can also play all the other tables, but they are locked behind a score limiter (meaning you will only be able to play them until you reach the score limit, and then you’ll need to stop). You can pay to unlock more timer-free tables, though, so if there’s one you really love, it is available to you.However, if you just want to zone out with some pinball, you don’t need to spend anything to enjoy Zaccaria Pinball. If some classic pinball hasn’t scratched your nostalgic itch, Super Bomberman R Online and Pac-Man 99 are also free titles. They’re both perfect for gaming with friends, as Bomberman supports up to 64 players at once, and Pac-Man can handle a whopping 99 users. GamingThe BestGaming, Nintendo, Nintendo Switch Let’s take a minute to discuss rubber bands. They’re made of rubber, and they can stretch out if you pull on them. Stretch a band out too far and it might break. It’s simple enough, but this everyday item makes a great metaphor. In this instance, rubber banding, or “rubber band theory,” can be applied to both game design and systems of economics.It’s no secret the global economy is experiencing some massive shifts, especially in the wake of the pandemic. CBS News reports that from March 21, 2020 to March 21, 2021, the wealth of the world’s billionaires increased from \$8.04 trillion to \$12.39 trillion. One example? Jeff Bezos’ wealth rose from \$113 billion to \$178 billion — an increase of 54%. Few can say they’ve seen a similar increase in their own wealth, percentage-wise, particularly during the pandemic, and this further highlights how wealth gaps are growing globally. When it comes to video games, and designing competitions in general, the resistance or friction that occurs when pulling back a rubber band is mimetic of a good sport. Winning feels amazing, but winning despite a hard-fought struggle is what keeps players coming back to their games and pursuing progressively more challenging levels and titles as they continue to play and beat each one. People love watching close games — triple overtimes with a back and forth. The same principle applies to video games. If you waltz into a dungeon and save a princess with no enemies to fight, puzzles to solve or other adversity to face, are you really going to “save and continue” your way through more of the same? This is also why games get harder as you progress through them. As you learn how to play, the skills you develop are put to the test bit by bit until the game culminates with a final boss. Similarly, Nintendo created a game that makes players want to hit the tracks again and again — they never know what new power-up they might receive to change their race outcome for the better. The game’s objective is not to “go” anywhere specific but progress in difficulty and beat your own record. This is where the items and the Mario Kart principle come into play. Running over a banana peel and being struck by lightning are elements that keep someone playing. That “rubber band” is pulled back a bit. A victory despite the challenge of facing other racers is what truly satisfies players. This rubber band philosophy can also be applied to economics. There’s the force that happens when the band is pulled back that mimics the friction of life and, in most cases, the work that needs to be done to progress economically. But also present is the idea that, if a rubber band is pulled back far enough, it’ll shoot forward in the direction it’s pulled in. So, if one is doing well financially or in life, that rubber band is loading up and is about to be (figuratively) shot forward. When things aren’t going the best — or, say, someone’s playing a video game and hasn’t quite hit the skill levels needed to win the game — that band would be shot to a lower level, in theory. With income inequality in its current state — the United Nations explains it’s “risen in a startling number of countries” over the past 30 years — one could argue that the rubber band has broken. If there were more checks and balances to keep people closer in line to each other, economically speaking, wouldn’t everyone come out on top?Consider 2020 and the COVID-19 pandemic. Mario Kart 8 Deluxe for the Nintendo Switch sold 10.68 million copies from April 2020 to March 2021. When humanity could not leave their homes, they needed something just as satisfying as viral soap-cutting videos that they could put hours and hours into. People can gravitate towards struggle in situations where they need satisfaction and something worthy of their time. If people can enjoy Mario Kart this much in their leisure time, what if we applied its design to different methods of life?
